

What is a standardized patient?

A standardized patient (SP) is an actor who is trained to convincingly portray the physical, historical and emotional features of a specific problem or scenario. This is done in a way that is valid, consistent, reproducible and measurable. In standardization, the aim is not to be the best, but to be the same in every session.

Standardized patient vs. standardized participant?

A standardized patient and participant are ultimately the same thing however a standardized participant would be used in non-medical encounters.

Why use SP's?

SP's are used in training or assessment environments to:

- Improve interviewing and communication skills.
- Practice physical exam techniques and procedures.
- Aide in the creation of educational and promotional videos.

SP Simulations are:

- **Realistic** - Difficult to detect that they are not the people they are portraying
- **Available** - Flexible schedules allow them to be utilized at any time
- **Reliable** - They are consistent with each repetition and standardized with other SPs playing the role
- **Controllable** - Situation can be controlled based on the setting, level of difficulty and amount of information given to the learner
- **Adaptable** - Meets the specific needs of the trainee as directed by the trainer
- **Risk Free** - Learners practice skills and learn techniques in a safe environment

The role of an SP:

- Provide students and professionals with the opportunity to:
 - Practice their skills before interacting with real people in real situations.
 - Promote continued learning and training.
- Offer constructive feedback so that students and professionals can gain insight into their strengths as well as areas requiring improvement.
- Help contribute to a fuller understanding of how to respond and react in a real environment.

Areas in which SPs can be utilized:

- Interviewing skills and techniques
- Conflict resolution training
- Facilitating difficult conversations: Breaking bad news, end of life care, etc.
- Continuing education/training support
- Role play
- Mystery shopper experience
- Lecture hall learning
- Educational and/or promotional videos
- Research participants
- General physical exams and clinical techniques
- Complex and/or invasive physical exams and clinical techniques
- The opportunities are endless.
